Miss Palmer, amongst other things, is to be greatly congratulated on having selected bright, crisp, effective, and short pieces for her pupils, although they all played very well indeed, it is possible to tire of long-winded pupils' pieces. Graceful delicate fingering, marked time, musical appreciation, and absence of playing for effect, were the predominating features of the first part of the programme. Miss Elaine Whiting, Miss Wooten, Miss Wolinski, Misses Powell, Bolton, Coppard, Holloway, and Clarke, Misses Eecb and Ironside, Misses Alderson, Whiting, Miss Foster and Master Tooth, Miss Enid Whiting, and Miss Mackay were the young ladies who discoursed really sweet music which was enjoyed by all. Many baskets and bouquets rose to the occasion, and these unexpected tributes were received with refreshing modesty. Miss Palmer managed everything herself, and deserves the plaudits that greeted her pupils, for they have been excellently trained. Probably many who played so prettily to the big audience are the ones who would say if asked to play at home: "Oh, no, we can't play a note," but it is to be hoped the Bystera of training received will banish all such unwomanly timidity. Pupils concerts like this are pleasurable all round. Miss Portas gave a grand recitation of "The Ballad of Silence," the weird attire was very effective, and her dramatic intonation, pathos, and force enhanced the solemn beauty of the piece. Mr. Evans Harp was indisposed, suffering from prevailing moist weather, hoarseness, so we lost a musical treat. Mr. Chambers kindly and most effectively filled the vacant chair, and sang a beautiful thing that suited his mellow cultured voice, Mr. Poussard accompanying on the violin. A quartette by Messrs. Evans, Bates, Chambers, and Walcot was a masterpiece of harmony, their voices blended in perfect unison, the absence of accompaniment being like a rippling sea without the waves of ferry boats. Miss Deane's powerful voice was like a fountain of water which could be thrown anywhere at will, soaring up in pure sweetness, then breaking into floods of, melody, rippling, into tricklets and bursts of tiny broken waterfalls; floating like spray glistening, and leaping from high to low with ease.

Dear Andrew.

Thank you for your recent enquiry about the attendance of the four Whiting sisters at Ascham during the 1890s and early 1900s.

Firstly, I can confirm that all four sisters attended the school. Secondly, thank you for your information about their dates of birth and their relationship with Linda and Eileen Teece, about which we had no record.

Unfortunately, our records during the time of the first Principal, Miss Marie Wallis, are almost non-existent. Consequently, we have also had to rely on the digitised newspapers for any information about students who attended the school before 1902 and we also had the same information about the violin performance of E Whiting in 1894. I'm sorry that I am not able to confirm whether it was Enid or Elaine.

The only other information we hold about any of the girls is as follows:

Enid (Mrs E N Waters) –two original telegrams sent by Enid in both 1894 and 1895 to classmate Ethel Lane Latham who won the Fairfax Junior and Senior Prizes for being the top girl in the State in the final school exams. There is also a reference to her marriage in the March issue of the school magazine in 1905

Elaine (Mrs R A Phipps-Waugh) – two similar telegrams as mentioned above. Her marriage to Dr Phipps-Waugh is referenced in the September issue of the school magazine, 1905

Sylvia (Dossie) - engagement mentioned in June issue of school magazine, 1904

Vera – potentially appears in two group photographs from 1901 and approximately 1904 held in archives (would need to check); debut at Union Club Ball mentioned in school magazine, May issue, 1906.

I hope this provides you with some helpful information. If you would like copies of the photographs and telegrams, please let me know.

WHAT WAS WORN.

The final day of the spring carnival was probably the most enjoyable of the four days. The weather was delightful, the crowd not so large, and in four out of the six racing events the favourite was first past the post. With regard to the frocking, it was remarkable on mentally reviewing the fashions and colours in evidence on each day that to sum up the whole effect judgment is in favour of neutral and pastel tints. The one-piece costume is not nearly so much favoured as the coat and skirt, save in the lingerie robes. The hats, were in many instances as large as the parasols. High collars have had their day. SYDNEY DAY-NURSERY ASSOCIATION.

On Thursday afternoon the annual meeting of the Sydney Day Nursery Association was held at the Women's Patriotic Club, Moore-street, Lady Cullen presiding. There was a good attendance, and much interest was shown In the proceedings. Lady Cullen said that the association was formed in August, 1905, to enable mothers to go out to work, and to teach them, not by theory, but practice, how a young child should be taken care of. The reduction in

Fire at Dr. Waugh's.

Shortly after '2 o'clock on Wednesday morning, the maids who enjoy open-air. sleeping on the rear verandah at Dr. Phipps Waugh's residence, Marsden-st., were wakened by a bright glare and the crackling of burning wood. Looking into the courtyard below they discovered the motor garage enveloped in flames. Their cries soon roused the doctor and his faithful man-servant, Benjamin Allen, as well as the telephone assistants who were working up above. Young Allen rushed out of his room and straight through the, flames by the door, behind which was a large touring car. Although the brake was on the young man pushed the car. out of danger, and then looked 'round to see what else he could save. But, there was no hope of saving anything- else, although the Parramatta firemen, with S. O. Alchin In charge, were on the spot within six minutes of receiving the call, and with one hydrant kept the fire from spreading. The fire was very fierce for about an hour. The garage was of fibre-cement, with Hmhoiv «iinnnrtK nnfl Iron roof. The fibre resisted the flames, but the heat caused the panels to burst with the noise of a cannon-shot. Mr. Pollock and others who live some distance away were awakened by the noise, and wondered where the war had broken out. Fortunately, a small car was away getting re-painted. -This car was usually kept in the part of the building in which the fire broke out. The origin of the fire is unknown. The garage was locked up for the night shortly after 6 o'clock. Many valuable parts and the usual garage outfit were destroyed, in addition to the building. The damage was estimated at £100, which Is covered by insurance. The Granville firemen were also on the scene shortly before the fire was. got under. Constables Connors and Constable were also quickly on the spot.

'A Parramatta Ward

The Soldier-'s Only Child. A Sad Story of the War.

Associated with the life of Captain Charles Edward Leer, who was amongst the Australian officers to fall in the preliminary military operations at the Dardanelles, is a story which begins in romance and ends in tragedy. For many years Captain Leer had been a teacher in the New South Wales Department of Public Instruction, and it was while stationed at the Rockdale Public School that he met the lady who was to become his wife. He was a pupil at the school, and. at one time was in the class taught by him. An attachment sprung up between the pair, but subsequently, when the captain's duties took him to another school, they drifted' apart. Eventually, however, they met again, and were married. The romance of their courtship continued through portion' of their married life, and when the captain, then an ordinary soldier, went: to South Africa to fight in the Boer war, his wife and baby girl took up their residence near the scene of hostilities. It was the next war in which the Empire was involved which was to bring the romantic career of Captain and Mrs. Leer to a close in a succession of tragic events involving them both, as well as the captain's mother. Captain Leer had not been in camp long before his wife took ill.' It was a serious illness, and Mrs. Leer, realising that, there -was no possibility of recovery, expressed to her relatives the belief that it would not bo long before her 'husband would be sent after her by an enemy bullet, and there would be a happy re-union hereafter. A short time afterwards, or about a fortnight before Captain Leer sailed, she died; and now, after a lapse of less than eight months, her husband has been killed. Captain Leer went away a very grief-stricken man, because the sorrow of the death of his wife was accentuated' by the loss of his mother a week later. Their one child, Miss Zillah'

Leer, is living in Parramatta with Dr. and Mrs. R. Phipps 'Waugh. When only five years old the child was sent to Miss Joan Waugh's boarding school. Her mother was not then very strong. About six years ago she returned home and had been living with her father until he left for the war. When he decided to go to the front Captain Leer, knowing the child's attachment to all of the Waugh family, especially the doctor and his large-hearted wife, asked Dr. Waugh if he would be one of her guardians and allow her to live with him. Dr. Waugh, who at that time was told that his services for the war would not be required for some time, was glad of the opportunity to make it easy for another soldier who was leaving, and now the doctor hopes that Captain Leer's daughter will still be left under his guardianship. It is Mrs. Waugh 's intention to adopt the child, who is now a young lady sixteen years of 'age, and if arrangements can be made to take her with them to England when they sail next Saturday.

Mrs. Elizabeth Rose Holden Waugh, widow of the late Dr. Isaac Waugh, who died ather residence, Tara, George-street, Parramatta, on Saturday last. In her 86th year, was one of the oldest residents of that town. Mrs. Waugh was a daughter of the late A. H. McCulloch, a prominent Sydney solicitor of earlier days. Dr. Waugh figured in the thrilling incidents connected with the shooting at Clontarf, by a demented man, of the Duke of Edinburgh, brother of the late King Edward. Dr. Waugh was a young naval surgeon at the time, and he was the first medical officer to go to the Duke's aid. He succeeded in stanching the flow of blood, and attended the Royal patient until the arrival of his Royal Highness' personal medical attendant. Mrs. Waugh was married at St. Mark's, Darlinghurst, in 1867, and in 1873 re-moved, with her husband, to Parramatta, where the remainder of her life was spent. She was a warm supporter of the Church of England. Prior to the interment an impressive service was conducted in St. John's, Parramatta, by the Rev S. M. Johnstone, assisted by Rev. H. W. Barder (All Saints', Parramatta). The chief mourners were Dr. R. A. Phipps Waugh (son), Miss Joan Waugh, and Miss Cassia Waugh (daughters). Mrs. Waugh (daughter-in-law), Mr. Bryan Waugh (grandson), Mr. E McCulloch (cousin), Mrs. B. Du Faur, Mrs. Basil Fairfax Ross, Mrs. E. Styles, and Miss Ethel McCulloch (nieces).

Mr. Leonard Dodds Death in Hospital MOTORING ACCIDENT The death occurred at Parramatta Dis-trict Hospital on Tuesday of Mr. Leonard Dodds, of "Widemere," Wentworthville, and formerly a prominent figure in mining circles in this State.

A week previously, while driving from Parramatta towards his home, Mr. Dodds' car overturned and he received injuries which caused his death. It is assumed that Mr. Dodds, who suffered from heart trouble became suddenly ill and lost control of the driving wheel. Mr. Dodds had had a wonderful experience in mining and financial matters, and his fund of anecdote made him a most interesting raconteur. He was exceedingly popular in this district where during ten years' residence he had made numerous friends. He was a son of the late John Dodds, R.N., and was born at St. Leonards in 1861. At the age of 26 he was a company promoter, and was associated with the early development of the Broken Hill mines. He was responsible for the flotation of Broken Hill Central Mining Company, and was also associated with the Nymagee Copper Mine, the Cobar mines, and gold-mining companies at Sunny Corner and Girilambone and elsewhere. Mr. Dodds retired from business about ten years ago, and took up residence at "Widemere". He was an art collector, and his display of Streeton's earlier paintings have been described as the best in existence. Deceased is survived by a widow, three sons and a daughter. The funeral took place on Wednesday, and prior to the interment in the West-ern-road Cemetery a service was con-ducted at All Saints Church of England by Rev. G.F.P. Manning. It was stated by sen. Cyril Westcott that the management of the Lapstone Hill Hotel was informed on three separate occasions that Miss Johnson would not be visiting the hotel. Mr. Kirkpatrick. managing Director of the hotel, stated to-day that he had received no notice to the effect that the flier would not be coming. and he had not been advised to cancel the booking. Mr. C H. Hay. Secretary of the Premier's Department, when seen regarding the matter, said he telephoned to the hotel, and was under the impression that he was speaking to Mr. Kirkpatrick when he said Miss Johnson would be unable to make the trip to the Blue Mountains. Death Under Anaesthetic Woman's Sudden Collapse Suddenly collapsing while under an anaesthetic, Violet Ella Blanche Denzel (33), of Northmead-avenue, Northmead, died at the Parramatta District Hospital on October 11. An inquiry was held by the district coroner (Mr. H. Richardson Clark) at Parramatta last Thursday. The evidence disclosed that Mrs. Denzel underwent an operation for the removal of the gall bladder. The operation was performed, and the stitching of the wound was about to be done, when the patient suddenly collapsed, and her heart stopped beating. All efforts to restore her were unsuccessful. Evidencxe of having adminstered the anaesthetic under the supervision of Drs. Waugh and Cedric Whiting was given by Dr. Kingsley, one of the resident medical officers at the Parramatta District Hospital who said that although there appeared to be no organic disease of the heart, the patient seemed to be suffering from the effects of toxemia. It was essential to operate. When she collapsed -and she collapsed very suddenly -the patient had been under anaesthetic for about an hour and a half. Dr. Cedric Whiting said that the proper anaesthetic was used, and that it was administered in a proper and skillfull manner. When the patient coppased

everything was done to restore her. The cause of death was myocarditis aggarvated by absorbition of poison in the system from the septic gall bladder. Mrs. Johnstone, sister of the deceased asked why the patent's strength was not built up in the hospital before the operation was performed. "She was getting worse all the time," Dr. Whiting said. "If the operation had been delayed, I have no doubt that she would have died from blood poisoning from the septic gall bladder." Dr. Waugh, who performed the operation said that the deceased had been suffering from inflammation of the gall bladder for the last eight years. " The only way to restore her health was to operate" the doctor said. The witness said that the anaesthetic was properly administered, and that, when the patient collapsed, everything possible was done to restore her. Regarding the question asked by Mrs. Johnstone, Dr. Waugh said that the patient did not require building up by food. If she had not been operated on, she might have died at any time. Mrs. Johnstone: You have been attending Mrs. Denzel for a long time. Why did you not operate on her before? An operation was suggested to her many times, but she didn't like the idea of an operation. Dr. Waugh said that, in twenty six years, this was his first experience of death under anaesthetic. The coroner found that the death was due to the anaesthetic and poisoning of the system from the septic gall bladder, that the anaesthetic was skilfully administered and the operation skilfully performed, and that, when the patient collapsed everything possible was done to restore her.

He served at the front with the A.&.O., with distinction, as did his partners, Drs. Keith and Cedric Whiting. Naturally, he has a very complete stock of Digger yarns. For some time he has been a Parramatta alderman and has found the job not unlike that of the football referee. Had he so desired he might have been Mayor for several terms. Dr. Waugh plays golf a little; there was a time when he played quite a lot. He found, however, that he could not attend a race meeting and play golf on the same Saturday afternoon-so he gave up golf. As a member of Parramatta Rotary Club he has delivered a few interesting talks' on his trips to the East. Of course, he did not tell all. He agrees with Cowper that: "Variety's the very spice of life, That gives it all its flavor."

H. Harvey, R. A. P. Waugh. W; R. Musto, W. Cameron, and H. Vaughan. and the town clerk (Mr. L. N.. Brown). "Lengthy speeches are quite unnecessary on an occasion like this," Bishop Hilllard said, "When we have before us an appeal that must stir everybody who has a drop of British blood in him. "The Motherland stands up. on behalf of civilisation and the future of the human race against the onslaught of thosi evil things with which Nazi Germany has assoviiited herself. She stands as the champion of all that makes life worth living. Y. i, "MAGNIFICENT PEOPLE." "London is standing up to it nagnlificently. And one thrills as one thinks, not only of those gallant young heroes of the air, not only of the magnificent men of the Fleet. not only of the gallant troops; but also of those magnificent people--ordinary humble people-who are proving to Hitler that he Just can't break the morale of the British people. "We must show them that we really are behind them; that we really want to share some of the burden that they are shouldering." Announcing that £1148 had been subscribed since the appeal was launched on Friday week, the Mayor said that the Parramatta Mayoral Patriotic Fund committee had donated £100. "I think it's the desire of the council that this fund should be closed as soon as possible," he said. "We want to make it a short and sharp, appeal, and hope to close it. if possible, at the end of next week," Emphasising the need for a more sustained effort. Alderman Waugh said that everybody should be given an opportunity to subscribe ar small amount regularly. On his motion Mrs. Cedric Whiting-from whom he had received the suggestion that house-to-house collections be made--was appointed to convene a meeting of ladles to organise stich collections. As money was needed urgently for relief in Britain, it was decided to make an intensive effort to raise as much as possible within the next fortnight, and then close "the main fund." Mr. and Mrs. R.
